Find the Google Duo app

- Ask your adult learner to find the Google Duo app. They can look for it on the device's home screen.
- Ask your adult learner to tap on the Google Duo app to open it
- If Google Duo isn't installed on the device, ask your adult learner to open the Google Play Store. They can search for Google Duo and download the app. If your learner has never downloaded apps before, do this lesson first.

Verify your number

Your contacts will video call you using your phone number.

- Ask your adult learner to select the country they live in (Canada). Then ask them to enter their phone number.
- Check with your adult learner if their mobile phone plan doesn't charge them to receive text messages
- When they're done, ask them to tap **Next**

Verification code

Confirm your phone number

- Explain to your adult learner that Google Duo will send them a text message to confirm their phone number. This message will have a verification code.
- Ask them type in the verification code.
 Once they finish typing the code, Google
 Duo will automatically sign them in.



Voice call

Make a voice call

- Explain to your adult learner that they can use Google Duo to call other people who have Google Duo
- Let them know the calls are done through the internet. This means if they are not connected to wifi, Google Duo will use data from their mobile plan and that can get expensive.
- Explain to your adult learner that to make a voice call, they'll need to select a person in their contacts list and then tap the **Voice call** button






During a voice call

- Let your adult learner know that they can turn off their microphone by tapping the **microphone** button at the bottom of the screen. This is useful if they don't want the person on the call to hear something, like background noise.
- Ask them to turn their microphone off, and then to turn it back on



Make a video call

- Explain to your adult learner that they can make a video call with Google Duo
- Let them know that Google Duo will use their phone's front-facing camera so that the person they're calling can see them
- Explain to your adult learner that they can make a video call by tapping the **Video call** button at the bottom of the screen

During a video call

- Let your adult learner know that they can turn off their video by tapping the **video camera** button at the bottom left of the screen. Ask them to turn their video off and then back on.
- Let your adult learner know that they can also switch to the camera on the back of your device. To do this, they'll need to tap the **flip** camera button, located to the right of the red hang up button. Let them know that they can switch back to the front camera by tapping the **flip camera** button again.

Add drawings in a video call

- Explain to your adult learner that they can doodle or draw during their video call
- Ask them to tap the **3 dots** at the bottom right of their screen. Then ask them to tap **Family** and then tap **Doodle.**
- Let your adult learner know that they can draw pictures on the screen for the other person to see. Let them know that when they're done, they'll tap the **blue arrow** at the top left of their screen to return to the call.










Add effects to a video call

- Explain to your adult learner that they can add an effect to their video
- Ask them to tap the 3 dots again and tap
 Effects
- Ask your adult learner to pick an effect from the bottom of their screen. Then ask them to tap the **blue arrow** at the top left of their screen to return to the call.

Add filters to a video call

- Explain to your adult learner that they can add a filter to make their video a different colour
- Ask them to tap the **3 dots** again and tap **Filters**.
- Ask your adult learner to pick a filter effect from the bottom of their screen. Then ask them to tap the **blue arrow** at the top left of their screen to return to the call.



End the call

• Explain to your adult learner that they can end a voice and video call by tapping the red **hang up** button






Leave a message

- Explain to your adult learner that if they call someone and that person doesn't answer, they can leave a voice or video message. Let them know that they can do this by tapping the **Leave voice message** button.
- Let them know they can choose not to leave a message by tapping the red hang up button to end the call

Start a group call


- Explain to your adult learner that they can talk with up to 12 people at once. Let them know that to do this, they'll need to create a group.
- Ask them to tap **Create group** at the bottom of the screen. Then ask them to tap on the names of the people they want to add to the group chat and then tap **Next.**
- Let them know that they can make a voice or video call to all of them by tapping on the Voice call or Video call buttons.

Receive a call

- Explain to your adult learner that if they receive a voice or video call, it will look like the picture above
- Tell them it will look a bit different on every device, so it won't look exactly like this picture
- Show your adult learner how to answer a voice and video call



Notifications

- Explain to your adult learner that if they miss a call, they'll get a notification on their device
- Let them know that every device will look a bit different. On some devices, they'll see a number on the top right of the Google Duo icon in their device's home screen or app launcher. This number tells them how many messages or missed calls they have. On other devices, they'll get a notification in the notification bar at the top of the screen.
